Program

Belton resident Phil Dixon, an expert on the Kansas City Monarchs and a cofounder of the Negro Leagues Baseball Museum in Kansas City, used slides to highlight the history of the league and the Monarchs,



who won their first pennant in 1923 and national championships in 1924 and 1929. The team included such all-time greats as Elston Howard, Satchel Paige, Buck O'Neil and "Bullet" Rogan, who some have described as the greatest all-around player who ever lived. He played both outfield and pitcher, winning over 400 games. The team's owners included J. L. Wilkinson, a pioneer in race relations who helped diversify the sport. Wilkinson is a member of the Baseball Hall of Fame. He was also an innovator, pioneering team travel by bus and night baseball. Dixon, who has authored 10 books, including a popular book on Buck O'Neil, recommended a movie called *The Winning Team*.
