## School Foundation has expanded its support of students and teachers

W earing her "second hat" as executive director of the Harrisonville Public School Foundation, Jill Filer gave Rotarians an overview last week of the foundation, emphasizing how it has grown since it was established nearly 31 years ago.

Those who helped start the foundation were Robert Prettyman, Linda Wheeler, Elizabeth Ballew, G.M. Allen, Dorothy Laster, Ray White and Ivan Beeman. It started with 100 founding donors who are acknowledged on the Tree of Knowledge display at HHS.



The foundation is governed by a 13-member Board of Trustees. Susan Holden is the current president. Rotarians currently serving on the board are Laurence Smith, Susan Lockard (treasurer), Gabe Sweitzer and Bing Schimmelpfenning (school board representative).

The foundation's scope has expanded significantly over the years as its general endowment has grown. It now stands at \$475,000. This allows the foundation to fund a variety of programs and scholarships, most of which are permanently endowed.

Programs include teacher grants up to \$1,000 each, district grants, reimbursement for advanced teaching degrees, new-teacher gift cards, the Educator of the Year program, funding for the Missouri Scholars Academy and Hugh O'Brien Youth

Leadership programs, the Distinguished Alumni Wall of Fame program, and the Excellence in Academics program, which started in 1987 as a way to recognize the top 15% of high school students. Four-year recipients of this honor receive a \$500 scholarship. Some 338 such scholarships have been awarded.

Last year the Excellence in Academics program was further enhanced with \$250 minigrants to four year award recipients thanks to Rotarian Bill Mills' Leaving a Legacy program, allowing students to "pay it forward" to an educational program of their choice.

All of this is in addition to the many scholarships administered by the foundation, which each year total more than \$32,000. Rotarians have endowed a number of scholarships, including the John & Wanda Foster Construction Trades and Ag Scholarships, the Allison Smith Memorial Scholarship, and the Donna Pfautsch HATS Scholarship. The Harrisonville Rotary Club has created an endowment with the foundation that annually awards four \$500 scholarships to HHS and Cass Career Center recipients.

The foundation engages in several fundraising activities, including employee contributions, Major Saver card sales, the Alumni & Friends Golf Tournament, and Excellence in Academics subscribers.
