

Fire Science students benefit from Career Center's training tower

A nne Hickman's guest last week was Cass Career Center's Fire Science instructor Bill Shaumeyer, a veteran firefighter and paramedic who gave an overview of a relatively new program that has grown in popularity with high school students.

Bill's 20-year career has included stints with the Battlefield, Centerville, Pleasant Valley and Claycomo fire departments. He received his certification as a firefighter in 2002 and became a paramedic in 2005.

The Cass Career Center program continues to grow and currently has 26 juniors and seniors enrolled., working on their certifications. A graduate of the program, Bill said,





One of the great advantages of the program is a fire training tower, which he said "allows us to be self-contained." (See photo on back page.) Students used to have to go other facilities in the area. The tower is frequently used by fire departments in the area for training. It was funded with the help of a state education grant and was built by Custom Container Living in Archie. "It was a five-year process to get the tower," he said. As he talked, Bill used a video to show how the tower is used for everything from search-and-rescue drills to live-burn scenarios. He also explained how the fire science curriculum integrates with other classes at the Career Center.

In the Q & A session, Bill answered the age-old question: Why are fire trucks red? It all goes back to the days when insurance companies ran fire departments and wanted their trucks to stand out. Red paint was expensive back then, so the red color tended

to signify the company was financially solid.

- President Doug passed around a sign-up sheet for Shop With a Cop gift wrapping on two Saturday mornings in December. This will be converted to a Sign Up Genius for online registration.
- Doug also reported on the experience Rotarian volunteers had at Shepherd's Staff
 Food Pantry on a recent Friday afternoon. More than 150 families were served, and
 Doug called it "a good service opportunity" for the club.
- Assistant District Governor Bing Schimmelpfenning reported that our club ranked in the top 3 in the district for attendance for the past quarter. Many clubs are still meeting virtually, which tends to reduce attendance.

The tower is used for hose and ladder drills, team building, search and rescue drills, and live-burn testing by the CCC Fire Science program. Built by Custom Container Living LLC, a company founded in 2015 by Robert Wagoner and based near Archie, the tower is similar to one the company constructed for the Dolan-West Fire District. Funding for the tower came from the state's CTE (Career and Technical Education) Performance Grant program. Two area companies, Elliott Construction of Pleasant Hill and Reasoner Grading of Creighton, donated time and services at no cost to the school.
