Restoration House provides home for victims of human trafficking

R otarians got a mini-education in human sex trafficking last week as guest speaker Dr. Rodney Hammer first explained the vast scope of the problem and then focused on efforts by his organization to combat it and provide services to the victims in our area. Dr. Hammer heads Restoration House KC, which is now headquartered in Cass County at The Farm in a donated property that formerly was the First Baptist Church of East Lynne.

He was introduced by Laurence Smith, who thanked Jesica Junge for helping arrange the program. Dr. Hammer was accompanied by Mary Bolling, business development manager. They shared handouts, including FAQs and donation forms. The website for more information is <u>restorationhousekc.org</u>.



An estimated 40 million people around the world are victims of human trafficking, Dr. Hammer said, and yes, it even happens in Cass County. Almost all victims are female, and up to 50% are under 18. Contrary to conventional wisdom, 9 of 10 victims are Americans, and the average age upon entry is just 12 to 14 years old. Typically, the victims are lured online and become exploited for their psychological or physical vulnerabilities. Perpetrators go to social media profiles and look for vulnerable kids, he said.

Restoration House, in addition to the adult facility in Cass County, also operates a facility for underage children and a coffee house in Greenwood that provides some

revenue for operations. The group has a Baptist affiliation and annually holds a gala fundraiser in Kansas City. The organization resulted from a gap analysis that showed a huge need for a residential facility. Residents can spend 1-3 years in recovery and redirection of their lives. The new facility called The Farm provides a wide range of resources for these residents, including a garden, gym, educational facilities and even pet goats. "It's a peaceful, safe and calming place," Dr. Hammer said.

He is a 1972 graduate of Harrisonville High School and a 2014 inductee into the Distinguished Alumni Wall of Fame.
